And watching fireworks as many times a year as I possibly can.





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


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THE CORNER OFFICE

CLEANING TIPS FOR THE BATHROOM

• Bars of soap too small to use effectively can be pressed into the sides of new bars softened by recent use.

• Shower curtains can be renovated by being washed, on gentle cycle, with a pint of white vinegar.

• If you have more than one bath to clean, keep separate cleaning supplies in each bathroom, that way you can clean the bath at a moments notice.

• To clean tubs and showers use a product that contains phosphoric acid, their is no scrubbing involved.

• Buildup on shower doors: Wipe with lemon oil. Removes buildup and keeps doors protected longer from future buildup.

• Removing mildew from shower or bath: 3 parts bleach and 1 part water -- put in spray bottle. Spray on mildew areas and it will virtually disappear.

CLEANING TIPS FOR THE LAUNDRY ROOM

• To remove perspiration stains in clothing, soak in warm vinegar and water.

• Microwaves can be used to emergency disinfect clothes, such as a child's cap that another kid has put on, as long as they have absolutely NO metal in the zippers, buttons, rivets etc. ALWAYS place a cup of cold water next to the article to absorb the heat and microwave on high until the water is steaming.

• Removing mildew stains from clothes: Begin by brushing of mold outdoors so you don't scatter mildew spores in the house. On washable fabrics, pretreat by rubbing detergent into the dampened stain. Then, launder the items in hot water, detergent and chlorine bleach, if it is safe for the fabric. If the stain remains, sponge it with hydrogen peroxide, rinse and launder. If the item isn't bleach-safe, soak it in an oxygen bleach that is safe for colors, then wash it. Take non-washable fabrics to the dry cleaner and tell them what the stain is.

• Urine Stains: For washable fabrics that can be bleached... presoak them in cold water for at least thirty minutes. Launder these fabrics in hot water using detergent and chlorine bleach according to the directions on the bleach container. For washable, nonbleachable items, sponge the stained area with a solution of equal parts of household ammonia and water then launder the item in warm water and detergent. Rinse it well. For non-washable items, sponge just the stained area with clear water to which a few drops of ammonia have been added. Then, sponge with clear water only. • Gray Dingies: One cause of the gray dingies is overloading the washing machine. When you do this, the clothes cannot move freely, resulting in poor washing and unremovable soil. To estimate the right-sized load, place dry, unfolded clothes in the washer loosely until it is about three-quarters full. Another cause is using non-phosphate detergents, particularly the granular type. If you're using a non-phosphate detergent, use the hottest water possible and dissolve the detergent in the water before adding the clothes. If you have hard water, you might want to add about a third to a half cup of packaged water softener along with the detergent.

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From Our Kitchen BLUEBERRY STUFFED FRENCH TOAST INGREDIENTS:

- 1 loaf French bread cut into 1" cubes (approx. 5 cups)
- 8 oz. cream cheese cut into 1" cubes
 1/2 cup fresh blueberries
- ¼ cup Stonewall Kitchens Wild Maine Blueberry Jam
- 6 large eggs, slightly beaten
- 1/3 cup maple syrup

• 1 cup milk

BLUEBERRY SYRUP:

- ½ cup Stonewall Kitchens Wild Maine Blueberry Jam
- 2 T water
- 1 T butter
- Dash of cinnamon

DIRECTIONS

- 1. Grease a deep-dish pie pan. Place half of the French bread cubes in the bottom of the prepared pie dish.
- Equally distribute the cream cheese cubes, fresh blueberries and Wild Maine Blueberry Jam over the top of the bread cubes. Top with remaining bread cubes.
 In a medium size bowl combine eggs, maple syrup and milk. Whisk until uniform. Pour over bread mixture. Place in refrigerator several hours or preferably overnight.
 Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Bake covered with foil for 30 minutes. Remove foil and continue to bake approximately 15-30 minutes more or until the casserole is set and the top is golden.
- 5. Combine syrup ingredients in a small sauce pan over medium heat until bubbly. Serve the casserole hot with the syrup drizzled over each serving.



Do you see where this is heading? I don't either so I am off to take a nap. I hear naps (at our age) are a very good thing. Thank you Martha Stewart!


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

the marriage going. In the 1970's her mother passed away. In the 1980's the recession hit and the mortgage on homes hit upwards of 18% which caused his business to dissolve ... other than odd jobs he was able to get here and there. His reputation of quality construction work was well known and he ended up being a supervisor for buildings in South Bend and the surrounding area and even supervised the building of a large country club in Florida where famous people shook his hand; Prince Charles was among this group - he visited shortly after the club's opening. This man from Chicago has kept pictures of his accomplishments in volumes of photo albums and shows them often, with pride.

Shortly after he was back on his feet, his younger brother was diagnosed with cancer; he died within three months. His father passed away a few years before his younger brother so his mother came back up north to live with the security of her last two living sons. Shortly thereafter his youngest brother was diagnosed with Parkinson's. This man took it upon himself to help his youngest brother who was going through a divorce at that time but the ailing man was then kidnapped by his children and taken to upper Michigan and checked into a nursing home - and left. Since the ailing brother was, by then, in the final stages of Parkinson's and was having difficulty with his speech, he was hysterical - and as a result, was heavily sedated by the nurses - until his brother found him and took him home. This man took care of his youngest brother until he passed away. His mother, then in her 90's, needed care next. He would patiently fix her breakfast, lunch and dinner. He would help her get dressed and would comb her hair. She quietly passed

there - looking as if she were still sleeping. All of his family is gone now but he still keeps busy with work, riding his bike 5 miles a day or walking (he always takes the same route).

He kept active after retiring because he was afraid that if he stood still he would shrivel up and die. When his wife turned 72 she had to retire from the post office. They celebrated their 50th wedding anniversary and tried to adjust to each other being home all of the time. There were more good days than bad days.

His wife had gotten an infection in her leg and he tenderly tried to help her take care of it. He would bathe the wound, put salve on it and bandage it but something was wrong. Her body built up fluids and her heart was being damaged from the infection in her blood. She was admitted to the hospital and had been there almost a week before the children were told. She was also diagnosed with a brain tumor; close to the brain stem. If the doctors operated it could make her a vegetable or she could even die on the operating table. She chose to not have the operation so her doctor told her to go home and enjoy what quality of life she had left. Since then the tumor has grown and dementia has set in. He patiently takes care of her because she is wheel chair bound and has lost the use of the right side of her body ... paralysis is slowly taking over her left side now. He has just recently asked for help; which he totally refused before. He is a proud man and thought he could take care of her himself ... his wife; his responsibility. Now his daughter and his niece come in every day and his granddaughter helps out in the mornings. He strives to make her comfortable and cooks all of her meals. does all of their laundry and every other domestic chore. Her dementia is worse and she says hurtful things sometimes that she would have never said before and it stings. You can see the hurt in his eyes

anger, but he knows it is the disease. She is reminded that they are all doing the best they can because they love her ... we know this because you will occasionally see a tear slide down her face and she will tell you that she knows ... and how badly she hates what it going on. He knows the end is near but he has honored his vows; through sickness and health. There's still love there ... you can see it in their eyes or when she tries to wiggle her toe up his pant leg while he is combing her hair. Their interaction is a testament to devotion and dedication. There will be a tough decision to make soon and it will hurt him dearly to make it. The empty house, not hearing her call his name, no tucking her in at night ... all of these things will remind him of his great loss. A caregiver has a rough job and it's not an easy job. It is a great sacrifice to give up your "self" to commit wholly to someone else to ensure that they receive the care they deserve until they pass.

I admire this quiet man and his dedi-

dedication to those they tend to; it is a hard job but the comfort you give to your loved one is the reward in the end.

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
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
